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Note of Meeting in Room 5062 on Thursday, 25th November, 1954.

Mr. Wood said that he had invited the Ministry of Agriculture representatives to come to discuss the question of swards in the case of the trawler "Hilding" because the Ministry had experienced considerable difficulty in forming an opinion on the matter. He explained that the report of the Court of Enquiry into the loss of the vessel paid tribute to the devotion to duty of the wireless operator Mr. Robertson, the Chief Engineer, Mr. Herdstra and the greaser Mr. Bond all of "Hildina" for devotion to duty and the Ministry's professional advisers were disposed to support the views expressed in the report. On the administrative side, however, it was felt that the evidence was so meagre, owing to the fact that the vessel was overwhelmed in such a short space of time, that it was impossible to form a firm opinion on which a recommendation could be made. He thought the it was as well that the Ministry of Agriculture should be aware of the difference of opinion since the responsibility for making formal recommendations for awards fell on them in this case,

Mr. Leach said that the Ministry of Agriculture had also given ble thought to the incident and after consulting their Technical Officers who were in a position to advise on the matter, they had come to the conclusion that it would be difficult to recommend awards in this case. They felt that the individuals concerned had done their duty but that it was not possible to say with any certainty that they had done more than their duty.

Captain Taylor said that he discriminated between the position of a Radio Officer and that of the two members of the engine room staff. He said it was not unisual for a trawler to heel over badly and that probably the two engineers would not have realised that anything serious was happening until the water experience their compartment. When that happened they immediately made their escape through a skylight.

In the case of the Radio Officer, however, he would be aware on being given the order to send out an SOS message of the extreme danger of the position, and the fact that he had stuck to his post and got out a message was he thought, a highly commendable action.

Mr. Colvilla emphasized the dangerous position of the engine room staff in the circumstances of this case. He thought that both the engine room men had stuck to their posts in a highly commendable way and had only made their escape when it was not possible for them to continue at their posts any longer.

In general discussion it was agreed that the lack of evidence renounced that it would be unwise to put forward any recommendation in the case of the crew of "Hilding".

Mr. Wood stated that the report of the Court of Inquiry paid tribute to the work of the skipper and wireless operator of the "Wella and that in the view of the Ministry, letters of commendation should be sent to the two men in question. This was generally agreed, and it we arranged that the letters would issue from the Ministry of Agricultur and Fisheries.

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## Posthumous Awards

You may find the attached three files of interest in connection with the "Hildina" case.

M. 5748/42: In 1942 the Master of a Swedish vessel rescued survivors from s.s. "Athelcrown", who had been on board the severely damaged "Diala" for seven days. agreed to award a piece of plate to Captain Thunberg.

Captain Thunberg lost his life when his ship was mined in 1943, so the plate was presented to his widow by the British Ambassador in Stockholm in 1947.

M. 9322/42: s.s. "Denpark" was torpedoed in 1942. the 3rd Mate and the 2nd Engineer estimated that the ship went down three quarters of a minute after being struck, but the Senior Nautical Surveyor estimated that the time was probably about five minutes.

The Radio Officer and 4th Engineer who went down with the ship were awarded posthumous Commendations. Minute 1 states that the Radio Officer "remained at his post sending out signals until the vessel sank, and appears to have been trapped in his cabin and drowned, and is a further example of a self-sacrificing act of courage and devotion to duty".

M.1027/43: s.s. "Ocean Vagabond" was torpedoed and sunk in 1943 and the Radio Officer received a poshumous Commendation He remained at his post to repair the transmitter in spite of being ordered to leave by the Master, and then got a message through to the destroyer escort which resulted in the survivors being picked up.

The "Hildina" file is at present with Captain Taylor.
